The first step is that they must let an adult know that a problem exists; we cannot help if we are not aware. It is our desire that all of our students develop tools for dealing with the challenges of daily life.

A message for parents from the Campbell County Department of Social Services



KEEP KIDS SAFE

“The only thing we have to fear, is fear itself.” These words of Franklin D. Roosevelt still have meaning today. Americans have greater fear of a terrorist attack today than any other time since 9-11-01. And many of these Americans are parents and role models to elementary school-aged children. These are children who are beginning to grasp the idea that death is permanent. Children who are confused about the world they live in will often make very negative assumptions.

Add to this concern the competing news media companies who are broadcasting on television all hours of every day. The incidents that do occur can often be sensationalized. We hear all the time that “perception is reality.” For many reasons it is important that parents maintain regular, open dialogue with their children. As we acknowledge that there are some bad people who do bad things, it is an excellent opportunity to talk about who can be trusted and give some basic precautions for avoiding trouble.

The four basic parenting pillars are to provide: (1) love, (2) structure, (3) consistency, and (4) safety. When we address having a safe physical environment, it is easy to overlook keeping a safe and secure emotional environment. Keep in mind the only natural fears for humans are extremely loud noises and abandonment. All other fears are learned, including fear of heights, closed spaces, snakes, clowns and terrorism.

Concerned parents can talk to their children and reassure them that they will be safe at home, at school, and anywhere else they may go. Remind them that there are policies in place to protect people, and that law enforcement is effective. Listen to whatever concerns a child may have and respond appropriately. Display confidence and a positive attitude, which in turn will be contagious. Attitude, more than even aptitude, will determine one’s altitude! A safe child will not only feel more secure, but also be more productive. Pass it on.
